Diner's Clubs provide a freshly prepared, nutritious meal, as well as entertainment, educational presentations, and the opportunity to socialize.



### DELTA ODD FELLOWS LODGE MARKS 100 YEARS OF SERVICE

**DELTA** — For 100 years, Delta Lodge No. 265, Independent Order of Odd Fellows, has served this community well and faithfully. This year, No.265 is observing its centenary. A banquet marking one hundred years of service was recently held in Delta's Beverley Elementary School with IOOF Grand Master of Ontario Lloyd Brown and long time Delta member, Ronald Morris, as guest speakers. Grand Master Brown presented a 100<sup>th</sup> anniversary plaque to Delta's Noble Grand Pat McCarthy.

#### Farmersville Was Mother Lodge

The seeds for the first lodge were planted in 1887, when 12 leading citizens of Delta journeyed to Farmersville (now Athens), to join Farmersville Lodge No. 237. Later that year, after having obtained their degrees, the 12 inductees decided to seek a lodge for Delta. They applied to the Grand Lodge of Ontario for a charter. Their request was granted, and on March 27<sup>th</sup>, 1888, the grand lodge directed Farmersville Lodge to act as the mother lodge to the new unit, and to initiate proceedings for the creation of the lodge. After the lodge was duly instituted, the members of the mother lodge supervised nominations, elections, and the installation of officers. In the wee hours of the morning, the installations were completed and Delta Lodge IOOF No. 265 came into being.

### 18 Signed Up

The first Noble Grand was a prominent Delta physician, Dr. John M. Sinclair. Eighteen members were signed on, the 12 original members being those who joined Farmersville No. 237, and six new initiates. The proceedings were supervised by District Deputy Grand Master D. Wiltse, of IOOF District 42. He was assisted by C. C. Lyman of Brockville, District Grand Treasurer C.L. Lamb of Farmersville, James Ross of Farmersville, and Grand Master James E. Kincaid of Brockville. The 12 originals included Dr. Sinclair, R.M. Percival, George Morris, Albert Gallagher, W. R. Singleton, Rufus I. Stevens, Russell Dowsett, John Williams, F.C. Austin, John H. Moulton, Matthew McArthur, and W.H. Denaut, Jr. Dr. Sinclair's executive consisted of H. M. Percival as Vice-Grand, F. C. Austin as Treasurer, Rufus Stevens as acting Past Grand, Albert Gallagher and John H. Moulton. Noble Grand Sinclair then appointed extra officers including George Morris as Warden, Matthew McCarthy as Conductor, W.H. Denaut, Jr., John Williams, and W.H. Singleton. Additional candidates for membership were interviewed, and duly accepted into the lodge. They included Joel Barlow, Luther Stevens, Wesley G. Niblock, Francis W. Singleton, and George Chamberlain.

#### Meetings

The members voted to hold their meetings on Thursday evenings at 7:30 p.m. The Treasurer reported that the lodge took in \$27 on its first night. The Singleton Block was built on King Street (photo-right) in 1885 with rooms above the businesses on the ground floor. The new lodge rented a meeting hall there and began to expand. William T. Sheridan was initiated on May 1<sup>st</sup>, 1888, followed by Bastard and Burgess Township Clerk John Brown, shoemaker Bill Hollister, William Humphries, stone mason W.J. Birch, and Baptist minister, the Rev. George D. Connors.




### Disaster Hit

Disaster hit Lodge No. 265 in 1896 when fire leveled the Singleton Block and wiped out all paraphernalia and records of the lodge. The members had to start over from scratch. All the lodge trappings, the books, papers, and documents were lost. For several months, the lodge members met in the kitchen of the Birch home, until a new block rose from the ashes.

### Jubilee Block

Named the Jubilee Block, the two-storey structure still dominates King Street, housing businesses as well as the Odd Fellows Hall, above Morris' Grocery. The new block commemorated the jubilee of Queen Victoria. Birch himself built the block and he was the janitor, caretaker and cleaner for the block. He looked after the lodge room, provided oil for the lamps, and heated the chamber by means of pipe from the stove in the store below. He charged \$25 a year for the heating and paid taxes of \$15.10 yearly to the township.



### Expanded Lodge

In 1907, the lodge rooms were expanded, and a kitchen was constructed. The kitchen was further extended in 1925 when the Rebekah Lodge was created. As the membership grew, the lodge began taking on an active role in community affairs. The lodge instituted an "At Home" social evening which was to prove the highlights of the year for Delta folk. Between 150-200 people attended this annual event. Lodge No. 265 also held maple syrup parties and brought in stage players for plays with the proceeds going towards the purchase of a piano and new regalia for the lodge. In 1947-48, the lodge attained its highest membership of 147 brothers.

### CPT Fund

The IOOF Cancer, Polio, and Tuberculosis Fund was launched, and the lodge has since paid out thousands of dollars for the relief of patients and research towards finding a cure. When the village needed a fire engine in 1937, the lodge bought up a large share of the debentures issued to cover the cost. It was the first motorized piece of fire equipment bought for Delta.

### KNOW YOUR NEIGHBOUR

Meet Bill Hayes; known to many as Wild Bill but with age, he is turning into Mild Bill! Many people know Bill from his musical talents at the Delta Fair or at Delta's Got Talent and, as many of you know, he likes to sing Elvis and especially Johnny Cash songs.

Bill was born in Kirkland Lake, and he has 3 sisters; Rachel (88), Isabel (86), and Jean who passed at age 84. He has 3 brothers: George (82), James (80) and Jack (75). Bill is the second youngest and we will keep you guessing what his age is. His sisters taught him how to read and do arithmetic which he loved. Bill's dad liked to move around a lot, so he attended many different schools including Otto Township outside of Kirkland Lake, Barrydale - North of Burk's Falls, Kearney, Melissa which is near Huntsville, Bear Lake - Seguin Falls, Sprucedale, Bancroft and high school at Norwood High. While attending elementary school in Bancroft in 1958, he can remember hearing this huge noise that shook the school so hard they almost fell out of their seats. Later they learned that this was caused by a supersonic jet breaking the sound barrier, probably the Avro Arrow.



Bill was very shy and quiet in school where he usually finished his work before the other kids so he would quietly read while the other finished their work. The teacher talked to his parents and suggested Bill advance a grade. His parents decided to let him make up his mind, so he decided to try it. It didn't take Bill long to figure out that it wasn't as much fun, and he asked to go back so he could be with his buddies. This is when he started to be a little more social to the point where he had to write lines "I must not talk in class" 100 to 200 times and if he argued, then it was five hundred times! Being crafty, he taped pencils together so he could write several lines at once.



When Bill graduated high school, he attended York University where he earned a degree in Psychology with a specialist in Special Education and Behavioral Modification. Bill was one of the first students at York to become a specialist in computer education. He was hired at a Toronto area school where he taught several different grades including special education. The very same teacher that made him write lines in elementary school ended up being the administrator at this school. There was a group of 17 boys that thought they were so smart they knew how to get away with anything. The principal asked Bill if he would consider helping with this group of troublemakers. By the end of the school year, he had 33 boys and 3 girls in his class. Bill made a difference in the lives of those students and many others for the next 32 years.

Bill was married for 19 years and lived in Willowdale with his wife. During this time, he went into sales, selling an automotive product called Molly Black Gold. A business associate of his, Bob Buck asked Bill to come down to Delta where he was building on a property along County Road 8. Bob had an immense knowledge of cars, and he became one of Bill's best distributors of the product. Bill had a trailer and Bob brought it to his property so Bill could stay in it when he visited. He travelled back and forth to Toronto before staying at motels in Westport, Newboro, and Seeley's Bay. When Bob got too sick to continue working on his property, he ended up going into the Veteran's hospital in Toronto and his family was thinking of selling the property. At this point, Bill needed to do something. Arnold Greenhorn had a farm across the road, and he suggested Bill put his trailer on his property. He could live there and help him out on the farm, so Bill helped Arnold with farm chores and the maple syrup production. Eventually, it became known that the Township had rules about living in a trailer year-round so Bill was told that he had to move

within 24 hours or both he and Arnold would get a hefty fine. Bill was able to find a house in Chantry and rent it from the lady that also owned the house where he currently resides. He lived in Chantry for quite some time and at one point, the house was divided so the owner could also live there with her 5 children. The kids and Bill had a blast with each other as they rode bikes together, played board games, told stories and just had plain good old fun. The house in Delta was empty and Bill decided he would approach the owner and see if she wanted to sell it to him; he needed a place of his own. He bought it and has lived there since 2000. Bill also owns another property in the village which is currently rented.

Bill loves to sing, tell stories, and was thrilled to go down memory lane with me. He even called his one sister to make sure he had his facts straight. Since moving to Delta, he is extremely impressed with the friendliness and kindness of all the people - both young and old. When you see Bill, have a visit with him and I guarantee you, he will keep you in stitches and stories.

Gene and Ricky are the owners of the '3 Continents B & B' at 83 King Street / County Road 42, Delta. 3 Continents reflects their heritage as Gene came from South Africa, Ricky is Canadian, grew up in Belgium and lived in South Africa. The couple arrived back in Canada with their children in 1997 and lived in Oshawa until relocating to Delta in June of 2022. After considering a new venture, the couple narrowed their choice down to seven properties after looking at over 300 homes online across Ontario. Eventually, 83 King Street was selected for their bed and breakfast.

Along with other Delta residents, Gene and Ricky were impacted by the microburst in July of 2022 when their basement was flooded and many of their furnishings were damaged. At that point, their home renovations

appeared much more intense than originally anticipated. After a slow and challenging start to the renovations, a local craftsman was hired to renovate and update the guest section of the residence. During the renovations, some old newspapers and cartoon clippings were found which have since been framed for display. Each bedroom has been given a name: The Poppy Room, The Bunchberry Room, The Protea Room (referencing the natural flowers of Belgium, Canada, and South Africa) and The Rideau Room. Two of the three bathrooms are connected to the bedrooms... One - the Spanish Style bathroom, and the other, the African Style bathroom. With the unforeseen need of extra work, the opening date of their B&B was delayed until August 2023 when their first guests arrived. 3 Continents B & B is lovely and so bright and spacious which would make any guest feel right at home.

Gene also has a bridal alteration business which she operated in Oshawa prior to the COVID-19 pandemic shut down. Since moving to Delta, word of mouth has spread, and her business has increased. Gene is a very talented seamstress. Her efforts in the transformation of wedding dresses, bridesmaid dresses, mother of the bride/groom dresses are breathtaking. 3 Continents B & B can be used as a wedding venue along with a big tent and beautiful backdrops for photos. In the event of rain, the home is big enough to host the party indoors. Attendees can be accommodated overnight followed by a scrumptious breakfast.



Ricky worked in Ajax as a landscaper, and now, he has used his talent, skill, and expertise in developing their B & B property. Sadly, there was a large tree in the front yard that had to be taken down. Luckily, he was able to leave a part of the stump and fashion two chairs out of the wood to sit beside it. In the back yard, there was a large overgrown tree stump that needed attention; a large part of it remains which the woodpeckers seem to enjoy. Later this spring, hundreds of daffodils and tulips will bloom around the stump. In the same area, there are large, raised beds which hold oodles of vegetables for farm to table use in the B&B meals.

Gene and Ricky have two children, Christopher and Nedushke. Nedushke has an eight-year-old daughter, Theron. Christopher can work online from home and is relocating to the home in Delta.



### **ROBERTSON CEMETERY NEEDS YOU!**



Delta's Robertson Cemetery is located near the entrance to Lower Beverley Lake Park on land that was donated by the Robertson family in the early 1800's and the Lower Beverley Lake Park Management Board in the late 1990's. The entrance of the cemetery, which is adorned with a masonry gate that was built by Lloyd Sawyer in 1994, serves as a foundation for the wrought iron sign that reads "Robertson Cemetery 1811".

This interdenominational cemetery, which is registered with the Township of Rideau Lakes and the Bereavement Authority of Ontario,

has 200 plots remaining to be sold at a very reasonable price. The cemetery is managed by a volunteer Board of Directors which was established in 1989 and meets three times a year. ### Happy Spring!

Rideau Lakes - The Daffodil Capital of Ontario - their sunny disposition is so welcoming, and a sure sign that spring has arrived!

We are happy to report that your letters and phone calls have made a difference! M.P.P. Steve Clark recently announced that a \$20K feasibility study has been approved to examine the options regarding flooding in the Village of Delta. The Ministry of Natural Resources and Forestry at Kemptville and Kingston along with the Cataraqui Region Conservation Authority will partner to achieve this goal. If you wish to reach Mr. Clark, his email address is <u>steve.Clark@pc.ola.org</u>.

During 2022 and parts of 2023, Lower Beverley Lake and the Village of Delta were part of the mandatory septic inspection program (along with Troy Lake). In 2022, 296 inspections resulted in 120 sites with no concerns, 157 sites with some remedial work needed, and 19 systems needing replacement. In 2023, 403 inspections resulted in 186 sites not requiring any more follow-up, 142 sites needing remedial work (like a pump-out), 68 systems needing full replacement and additional information was required for 7 systems. Keeping our lakes clean and clear is so very important for our future generations; thanks to all residents who took part.

As a result of concerned citizens asking for a dog park, the Township may bring "doggie poop bag dispensers" to the Village. The municipal Parks and Recreation Master Plan is currently in its draft form and will be presented to Council later in March.
